## LET FREEDOM RING

On December 5, 1955 the people of color of Montgomery, Alabama, launch a one-day boycott of the city buses. They protest Rosa Parks' arrest for refusing to give up her seat on a city bus to a white person. The boycott is a resounding success, and extends and expands into a movement to end segregation in Montgomery, with national and international support.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., is a young preacher in Montgomery, who initially does not want to participate in the boycott because it comes at an inconvenient time. Dr. King reluctantly agrees to allow his church to be used for a public meeting and then is drafted to be the movement's spokesperson.

This is the story of Dr. King, his rise as a civil rights leader, his quest to effect social change by non-violent means, and the movement of all people who yearn to be free.

## AbOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT AND DIRECTOR

Paul B. Handy grew up in Baltimore City and the Washington, D.C. suburbs. He received his B.A. degree from Rutgers University - Livingston College, with a double major in Labor Studies and Sociology, and received his J.D. from the University of Baltimore School of Law. Paul is an administrative law judge with the D.C. Office of Administrative Hearings. Previously, he was a judge with the Maryland Office of Administrative Hearings, an assistant public defender in Maryland, and a solo practitioner.

Paul has written 16 plays that have been publicly produced. Paul's "Full Truth" has been performed six times, four times for the purpose of raising money for scholarship funds. Paul's play, "Cry for the Gods," about the overthrow of Hawaii's Queen, won four awards at the 2004 Maryland Community Theatre Festival, was performed in the 2011 Capital Fringe Festival, and was sponsored by the Hawaiian delegation to Congress, in support of a bill granting rights to native Hawaiians. "Let Freedom Ring," about Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the Montgomery bus boycott, was presented at Howard University School of Lawand was sponsored by District 4 of the National Association of Women Judges (NAWJ). Judge Handy is a member of NAWJ. NAWJ awarded NAWJ Equal Access to Justice scholarships to two Howard University law school students during the program. Other plays include "The Sound of a Tree Falling," "Satellite Parking," "Suffering Fools," "Preaching to the Choir," and "Merryman." Paul is married to Frances Recio, an attorney with the United States Department of Health and Human Services. They have twins, Marisa and Daniel, who just turned three.
